Researchers in New Hanover County have constructed an online audio archive of World War II veterans from their area. The North Carolina State Archive's Sion Harrington, in Raleigh, is spearheading an initiative to assist local North Carolinians with capturing this vital part of our past. The Library of Congress in Washington, working through the Veterans Administration, is also conducting a number of projects to record World War II and later veterans' stories. Now is the time to act to capture this important part of our past. Scores of World War II and later veterans are currently dying without a record of their story. The theme of the 2007 North Carolina Library Association Conference was "Telling Our Story." (The theme was interestingly also suggested by Kevin Cherry.) Let's all get together and work toward capturing the stories of the remaining World War II and later veterans currently living in North Carolina.

On another note, North Carolina librarians are losing a well-respected librarian to the Feds. Kevin Cherry is moving to Washington to head the Library and Museum section of the Library of Congress. *North Carolina Libraries* wishes him well, and he will be missed in his native state. Hopefully we will see him back before too long.
